Does the conference have workshops?

Yes – Pervasive Health 2011 will present 10 (5 half day and 5 full day) workshops that address innovative and important topics related to the application of pervasive technologies in the field of healthcare.

What is a Workshop? Workshop proposals (2 pages submissions)

Several workshops will be run in conjunction with the conference. The purpose of these workshops is to discuss work in progress and explore opportunities for new research related to pervasive healthcare.

How do I run a workshop / submit a workshop proposal?

Proposals for workshops should be submitted directly to the workshops co-chairs at "**workshops**" [at] "**pervasivehealth**" [dot]"org", and proposals should indicate the preferred duration for the workshop (half/full-day).

Who can attend a workshop?

Authors of accepted papers, invited speakers, organizers.

Can I attend the workshop without registering for the full conference?

Yes – register and pay for workshop only

Who pays to attend a workshop?

Workshop organizers (up to two places) can attend their own workshop free of charge – please email the names of your ‘free place’ organizers to the workshop chairs asap. Workshop fees can be waived for invited speakers (but not for the main conference). Again, please email the names of any invited speakers directly to the workshop chairs. Accepted paper authors are all welcome to attend. One MUST register and pay for the workshop. All other authors attending (they don’t have to) must also register and pay for the workshop.

How are workshop fees collected?

Attendees should register and pay via the main PH conference website. Workshop organizers should email the names of ‘free places’ (up to two organizers plus up to two invited speakers) to the workshop organizers and these people will be registered for the workshop manually.

Will workshops be charged for facilities by the conference?

Workshop fees cover all participant costs (catering, room booking audiovisual etc.)

If you have any other costs you will have to cover them yourselves

What is a full paper? Full papers (up to 8 pages submissions)

Full papers are submissions describing results and original research work not submitted or published elsewhere in one of the four main categories listed below. Full papers should properly place the work within the field, cite related work, and clearly indicate the innovative aspects of the work and its contribution to the field.

What is a Poster? Posters (up to 4 pages submissions)

Authors are invited to submit work in progress whose preliminary results are already interesting to Pervasive Health audience. The poster track will give Pervasive Health attendees a way to learn about ongoing research initiatives and will provide presenters with an excellent opportunity to receive invaluable direct feedback from experts.

What is a Demo? Demos (2 pages submissions)

The demos track will showcase the latest developments and prototypes related to the topics of interest of the conference. The expected demo submissions should describe the technical details of the demo alongside its contribution to the healthcare domain.

What is a Position Paper? Position Papers (2 pages submissions)

Position papers are envisioned to provide insight into the lessons learnt from current (industrial, practitioners, government, etc.) pervasive healthcare practice. The position papers track is envisioned to provide the view of practitioners to the pervasive health community in order to have a more clear understanding about the real needs of healthcare operators and in this way shorten the gap between technologists and the every-day needs of practitioners.

What is a Doctorial Consortium? Doctorial Consortium (4 pages)

This one day event will enable doctoral students to present and reflect on their work alongside other doctoral students and a panel of experts. Submissions should include a description of work done, intended future work, alongside a specific research question or challenge that you would like to be discussed at the consortium.

Size: Maximum A0, minimum A2

Poster layout: Portrait

Style: Colour if possible
